This means that women's voices are still not heard equally in the decisions that most affect our lives. In *Lean In*, Sheryl Sandberg examines why women's progress in achieving leadership roles has stopped, explains the causes, and offers certain solutions that can empower women to achieve their full potential and even become leaders.

Sandberg is the chief operating officer of Facebook and is one of the 50 Most Powerful Women in Business and Time's 100 Most Influential People in the World. In 2010, she gave an exciting TED Talk, in which she described how women have no choice but to hold themselves back in their careers. Her talk, which became a sensation and has been viewed more than two million times, encouraged women to "sit at the table" in an office, seek challenges, take risks, and pursue their goals with strong desire and energy.

In *Lean In*, Sandberg digs deeper into these issues to make readers aware of the prejudices surrounding the lives and choices of working women. She describes her own decisions, mistakes, and daily struggles to make the right choices for herself, her career, and her family. She also explains specific steps women can take to reach professional and personal achievement at the same time and shows how men can benefit by supporting women in the workplace and at home.

Written with both humor and wisdom, Sandberg's book inspires women to take action and pursue individual growth and professional development. *Lean In* is sure to change people's concept from what women can't do to what they can.
